Despite the welcome arrival of vaccines, COVID 19 still evokes a niggling fear in many hearts. Anxious fear can awaken an almost hidden but real, selfishness within us, individually and communally. Group selfishness can masquerade as virtue or even as patriotism as we have seen recently. Fear can lead us to even see our selfishness as being for the good of ourselves and of those closest to

Our generous enthusiasm that built a maternity unit in Turkwel last year helps to keep us sensitive to all the blessings we enjoy and can share with others less fortunate than ourselves. For many years now, a Trócaire collection box in the kitchen has frequently



alerted us to the ravages that famine, war and climate change, continue to wreck among our family members especially in Africa. On our behalf Trócaire continues to alleviate the distress no matter how challenging the task while awakening an ongoing antidote to the "hidden" selfishness in our lives. An urgent task this week is to collect your box (and one for a neighbour or family member) from the church. Alternatively, you might designate a piggy bank or jar, labelling it as Trócaire for this year. Of course, if your income has remained stable during this lockdown and you have saved money by not going out, you may be able to send a lifesaving gift to Trócaire this week. Like all charities, Trócaire is struggling financially to keep all services running just now.

As we hear in Sunday's Gospel, Jesus weakened by hunger and maybe, afraid, after His forty days of total lockdown in the desert, overcame the temptation to put His trust selfishly in food and possessions. We too, can overcome our selfishness by risking generosity. Generosity is our vaccine and our antidote against fear and selfishness. Every day we have a choice either to feed the greed or take the antidote.
