INTEGRAL ECOLOGY and Laudato Si' – a better way to see our world

Gerry Forde returned to Ireland in 2004 having lived and worked in Africa and the UK for twentythree years. Since then he has worked with the SMA, first as Coordinator of Cois Tine, a project supporting African Asylum Seekers and Refugees and since 2010 as the SMA Justice Officer. In this role he has, in cooperation with other SMA Departments, groups and organisations, worked to raise awareness of various justice issues and to promote a Christian response to them.

Professor Emer Rogan is a lecturer in zoology in the School of Biological, Earth and Environmental Science at UCC. A marine biologist, she has worked on numerous topics, including fisheries and marine mammals for 25 years. Most of her research focuses on cetaceans (whales, dolphins and porpoises), looking at abundance, distribution, management and conservation.

Looking to the Future with Hope

How can we retain hope even in the turbulent times of crisis through which we are living? To allow hope to grow and sustain motion into a more positive future, we must nurture our ability to imagine a variety of positive outcome, even if they may not seem the most likely ones. There are many possible outcomes to the planetary emergencies we are facing, and our collective thoughts, prayers and actions can affect their likelihoods. Hope can be found in a great variety of places, from our inherent spirituality and sociability, to our instinctive desire for equality and social justice, to emerging science and technology. This talk will explore these themes in the context of the Lenten season.

Denise Gabuzda teaches Physics and Astronomy at University College Cork. She has been a member of the Cork Quaker Meeting for about 13 years, and is currently the Clerk of Ireland Yearly Meeting, the all-island Quaker body. Her scientific and spiritual lives converge on learning to live sustainably and in harmony with Creation as the key task of our time.

Mary Elmes – The Quiet Heroine

Ms. Anne Twomey

Cork woman Mary Elmes devoted her life to helping refugees and was responsible for saving hundreds of Jewish children from Nazi death camps during World War 11. A new bridge in Cork has been named in her honour. Anne Twomey recounts her life from 1908 in Ballintemple through her incredible work to her death in 2002.

Anne Twomey received the Lord Mayor's Civic Award in 2020 in recognition of her commitment to local history through her role with the Shandon Area History Group and her contribution to the North Presentation Secondary School adult education and community service.
