March 20th, 2022 "TAKE OFF YOUR SHOES"

Luke 13: 1-9

Spring is a time of new beginnings. Leaves sprouting, birds nest—building, daffodils thriving despite the gales, all indicate new life. Hope is in the air. Good beginnings engender hope. It is almost as if a bountiful harvest can be foreseen. But there is many a slip between sowing good seed and harvesting a bumper crop. War can wreak havoc, perhaps, even total destruction. Still, there is always hope. Without hope nothing worthwhile is achieved.

Something similar happens in all human life, Baptism, First Communion, Confirmation and Marriage vows, all speak of new beginnings, pregnant with great expectations, selfishness and sin, fear and fantasy, pride and prejudice can retard growth into mature faith filled living. But no matter what the setbacks here, there comes an opportunity to make a fresh start. Lent is one such opportunity. Use it or lose it.

This weekend's gospel uses the challenging image of the barren fig tree to remind us that we are called to go before the Lord whenever He calls with a bumper harvest of good works of kindness to those in need, of fidelity in the face of suffering, of steadfastness in keeping faith alive and shared. The opportunity is allowing God into our lives in a deeper way, allowing Him to deepen the friendship between us. For this to happen, we must surrender some selfish comforts from our lives. When God was coaxing Moses to a deeper bond (1st Reading), He asked him to take off his shoes. Sturdy dependable shoes were essential for his safety and comfort on his desert journey.

What does He ask each of us to give up?

Two interconnected crises: the Covid-19 Pandemic and the Ecological Crisis

Last august, Archbishop Farrell published his first pastoral letter as Archbishop of Dublin. *The Cry of the Earth - the Cry of the Poor* addressed the climate crisis and highlighted how environmental degradation is linked to poverty, suffering and migration.

Introducing his talk, the Archbishop cautions: "The Covid-19 pandemic has brought to the fore all that has been outlined in *Laudato Si*". Everything is interconnected. The ecological crisis is multi-layered. We have to take care of our neighbour, we need to respond to the people in Africa and India, because if we d not, it will come back to bite us".
