The Struggle

I used to teach English Literature in Secondary School; Poetry being one of the important elements of that teaching. You should go through the structure, how it is shaped, how it develops, how the language is formed, but you should resist trying to explain the poem. Instead, a teacher is meant to encourage the experience of the student when the poem is read, what it sounds like to you, how it speaks to you. It is possible the teacher might plant an idea in the student; an image, a word...this could then lead to more words or ideas and a sharing might take place. If it seems like a long, complicated poem, you might go a stage further and explore the struggle of the poet to express what he or she is trying to say or how to express a deep feeling from within in the new creation which is this poem. This struggle could be played out in those few words like a play or some drama. And the experience of seeing that struggle gives us an insight into the poet and how the poem can express all this.

This weekend we have the story of the struggle of a seed. The sower goes out with it but it ends up all over the place: in thorns, stony ground, pathways with no moisture. It is almost by chance it lands on fertile ground and yields a harvest beyond all previous records. In the shortened version of the gospel that is read, the story or parable (a story containing a moral or message) is just read out on its own; the longer version, containing Jesus' explanation is not given. Like the poem at school, we might be asked ourselves what it means to us, what idea is planted in our own minds. Are we like the sower, struggling to do the job of sowing? Are we the soil? What seed are we trying to sow? Is it like our own struggle in life to express ourselves, to form our own thoughts, to make sense of what is within us? Is there a message we can take away from it?

Maybe the answer is to have patience. Maybe the sower is someone who fails over and over again to plant properly, that the thorns, stony ground, pathways are a sign of previous efforts that seem to have failed. But with patience and getting to know yourself and what you are trying to do, you will hit the 'rich soil' in the end, you will find yourself. You might even discover they were not failures at all but part of the struggle of an inner journey of faith and hope and trust will be worth it all. God who sows the seed knows what it means to plant his word in different people in different situations. It all takes time. God will wait for us.
