What we are to be in the future

The Second Reading from the First Letter of John says:

"We are already the children of God but what we are to be in the future has not yet been revealed. All we know is, we shall be like him for we shall see him as He really is".

Today, in the middle of Easter, we celebrate Good Shepherd Sunday, and we are asked to think of our priesthood. We hardly know our Church in the last few years, and we are not sure of the future. It is all in the mind of God.

One of the most popular images of caring and protecting is of the shepherd; wandering with the flocks, sometimes in thousands, wherever they went. The strange thing was; sheep have very poor eyesight, yet the shepherd kept following. They are very focussed, these wandering figures, anxious for their care to the point they almost surrender their lives to keep them safe. They are outsiders and people were occasionally hostile to them because they wandered into private land according as the seasons changed. It seemed their own lives mattered less than the sheep.

When Jesus used this image to identify himself, there was already a tradition of shepherding. It was while he was out in the fields that the young boy David, almost forgotten, was chosen to be King. In the Book of Samuel, David himself describes how he had to fight away wild animals from taking his flock. Much later on, we note Patrick tended sheep in the Mourne Mountains, although not by choice. Interestingly he says it was the place he discovered his own faith. In his life and death, Jesus sought out the lost and the forgotten: the story of the one lost sheep. He searches until a find has been made.

Perhaps this might serve as a sign for now, with our 'lost' vocations to the priesthood. These vocations are probably there but 'lost' in the present moment of life. Jesus the Good Shepherd will search with us until a find has been made. There are two other losses we might ourselves help to restore: the loss of the language of faith and Godly things in the conversations of life; and the loss of community of support for those who might be open to a calling as a new shepherd. What are to be in the future may depend on this.
