Boats

For an island nation we Irish have a complicated history with boats and the sea. It's only in fairly recent years that we have a flourishing fishing industry; we have only a modest merchant and defence navy. During the Potato Famine the worst hit places were by the coast, with absolutely no evidence that fishing came to the rescue of a starving population. When I was stationed in Skibbereen and Baltimore historians there will tell you that there was no sense of enterprise among the native population, no boats of any kind; and the only people who fished were from the planted population, originally from Wales. Add to that the fact that the boat or ship symbolised the negative: carrying thousands of our people emigrating from our shores. We did not seem to have the confidence of a seafaring nation.

Lacking confidence of a different kind is Simon in this weekend's gospel. Fishing is in his blood in this Galilee, teeming with life and enterprise, a crossroads of people travelling all about. Simon and his companions are surprised by Jesus when he climbs into their boat for an unusual reason, to teach from it. He surprises them even more by asking Simon to put out into the deep and lower his nets for a catch. There is a miraculous result. Why is this?

It has always been the case with Jesus that only faith can make a miracle; a healing might take place but it won't be a miracle. A miracle needs an act of trust in the power, it needs a change of heart and spirit in the person. The faith that is present this weekend is in Simon; whatever Jesus said could be trusted: so much so that they left everything and followed him. There will be many more times that his faith will be tested, very often in that same water.

The Bishop recently published a Prayer from the Boat, entrusting our diocese into the same power that drew Simon and his companions, seeking new ways of being a seafaring faith; asking for the confidence to set forth on new horizons together.
