Conversations in the Spirit

Earlier this week, our four parishes here met in the Crypt to set forth on a journey of prayer and discernment at the invitation of the Bishop. About forty of us gathered to hear a presentation on the Sacrament of Baptism as the gateway of all of us Christians on our journey of faith. As part of this presentation we were invited to have 'conversations in the Spirit'. These conversations are based on what Pope Francis called our engagement with one another, not just in sharing ideas together, but in allowing ourselves to be changed, that we will no longer be the same person at the end of the conversation as we were before; nothing dramatic or earth shattering, but a change of heart perhaps through what we hear. So we started in our group to gather ideas of how Baptism can be a real welcome and a blessing for a family, not just a social event; how it could be celebrated in a more meaningful way, such as during Mass. If during Mass, how best we can convey how important that would be, and how they can be convinced. Then the next step would be how we can bring the newly baptized child and family together on a faith journey; like Sunday School or something like it with children on a Sunday morning. The idea was to show that the Holy Spirit was at work in us even as we were speaking together. We shall see how we can set out from this.

The Sunday Gospels in Lent this year are from Luke, who was regarded as the Evangelist of the Holy Spirit. That Spirit led Jesus into the wilderness, which is regarded as the home of the devil. The previous person who battled against evil in the wilderness was John the Baptist; so also Job battling against despair in the Old Testament. Jesus spent forty days and forty nights in this struggle. The number of forty, whether in days or years, represents preparation time; expectation of some sort for things or events to come. Now, just as we did during Advent, we have left 'ordinary time' to pursue a journey of expectation in Lent. The Gloria and the Alleluia will not be proclaimed until that journey is complete at Easter. The vestment colour is purple, the colour of Hope. Every day will bring different hints, images, and prophecies of what is to come. We will come face to face with a struggling Jesus, having his own 'conversations' in the wilderness; how changed he will be at the end of those forty days.

Like our 'conversation of the spirit' and Jesus' struggle in the wilderness, we too might be changed after our own Lent is over; our own forty days might search inside ourselves and find ways of knowing, loving and serving...so as to be changed forever.
