King and Criminal

This weekend marks the last Sunday of the Church's year; Jesus Christ, Universal King, St Luke brings us to the foot of the cross on Calvary where over the head of the condemned man was the title of his crime 'Jesus Christ, King of the Jews'.

So, there it was then, he claimed to be King.

This king ate with tax collectors and sinners. This king was anointed by a woman who had a bad reputation in town. This king converted the woman at Samaria who had three husbands and was living with one who was not her husband at all. This king was spat on, mocked and put through a sham trial. This king sought out criminals as guests for the final banquet and now finds himself between two of them, condemned.

It is interesting that St Luke is the only gospel writer who has Jesus between the two criminals and gives us this contrast between the mocking one and the embracing one. Interesting too that the embracing one calls him by name, 'Jesus', not by title, followed by lines frequently quoted 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom'.

It is an extraordinary scene, Luke gives to the embracing criminal an insight that nobody else would have seen or understood, perhaps, not even his disciples, where were they anyway? Who else would have seen this Jesus as a king at that moment? Who else would have seen beyond the idea of what a king really was?

The monarchies of the world have departed; once upon a time there were so many monarchs and kingdoms; now there are few. New powers have emerged, not all of them for the better. The fate of kings is very much present in the first Reading. David had been a fugitive, a criminal if you like, when he was brought back to become king after Saul's death. He becomes the anointed one after his people reminded him he was of their kin.

Here the 'kin' of Jesus included these criminals: he ends up between them both, the kind of people he had sought out in his ministry.

Thus the King and the Criminal travel to paradise together.

This is the king we celebrate this weekend.
